THE MISSING LYNX PROJECT

Northumberland is rich in history and rich in wildlife, though many of the animals our ancestors would have known are now missing. Some of these species have been lost forever, but others could one day make a comeback.

Lynx were present in Britain until at least the 5th century AD and likely lived on well into the medieval period. They were finally lost due to hunting and the destruction of the forests they called home. By the 20th century, lynx had been lost from most of Europe as well. Fortunately, conservation work on the continent has turned their fortunes around. Since 1970, lynx have been reintroduced to Germany, Switzerland, Poland, Austria, and more countries, creating thriving lynx populations across Europe. The Missing Lynx Project was set up to investigate whether they could one day return to Britain, too. [Continued on page 5]

Could lynx live here again?

Reintroductions need a lot of thought. There are many questions that must be answered before a project can even be considered. One of the first is: 'could the animals survive here?'. To find out, the project worked with European experts and used the latest lynx knowledge. Advanced computer models tested whether lynx could survive anywhere in Britain. The evidence revealed that a lynx reintroduction in Northumberland could create a healthy population. This is the only area in the whole of England and Wales with enough woodland to support lynx. But proving lynx could survive here is only the first step. Finding out what people think is just as important. Lynx could only return if local people are accepting of them back in the landscape.

A wild balance

If our woodlands were a puzzle, they'd be missing a piece. As top carnivores, lynx mainly hunt deer and can help trees grow by preventing over-browsing. They leave behind remains that feed scavenging birds and can bring other benefits too. Bringing lynx back would restore this missing puzzle piece. But it's been a long time since we've lived with lynx, so people understandably have a lot of questions about how lynx would affect them if they were to be reintroduced. Lynx are woodland animals and are wary of people. They pose no danger to humans, but they do occasionally take sheep. This is relatively rare across Europe and depends on sheep farming practices, such as how much time the sheep spend in woodlands. There are ways of reducing this risk even further and the project is working with farmers to investigate how they might help in Britain.

Lynx on tour

To give as many people as possible the chance to learn about lynx, we created the Missing Lynx Exhibition. Interactive displays bring the lynx to life, exploring everything from their lifecycle to how people in Europe feel about living alongside them. It's also an opportunity to share your views on lynx. This is a conversation where every voice counts. This free, family-friendly exhibition will be visiting the Great North Museum: Hancock until the 4th of August. Come along and discover more about this missing mammal!
