# GILSLAND TO FEATURE IN CELEBRATED HISTORIAN'S NEW BOOK

Renowned historian and the author of over 40 internationally published books, Alistair Moffat's next work will feature Gilsland as he explores the region in the wake of the end of Roman rule.

Variety is the spice of my writing life. Since the completion of my new History of the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, I've begun a new project that begins a long way south of the mountains and the glens. The story will move through countryside familiar to readers of this newsletter and here is an excerpt from the extended treatment I will work from. The book will be called Living Among the Ruins: Britain After Britannia.

Some time in the 8th or 9th centuries an unknown English bard composed an elegy. He mourned the departure of glory, the decay of an ancient city and the silencing of bustling streets, squares and public baths where prosperity had once flourished, where soldiers in their 'gold-bright' war splendour 'proud and flushed with wine…looked at treasure, at wealth, at jewelry'. Known as The Ruin, the poem begins:

This masonry is wondrous;
Fates broke it,
Courtyard pavements were smashed;
The work of giants is decaying.
Roofs are fallen, ruinous towers,
The frosty gate with frost on cement is ravaged,
Chipped roofs are torn, fallen,
Undermined by old age.
The grasp of the earth possesses the mighty builders,
Perished and fallen,
The hard grasp of earth,
Until a hundred generations of people have departed.

Copied on both sides of a single page in the Exeter Book, a 10th century codex of Old English poetry, some of The Ruin is illegible, the words obliterated by a long burn mark. But the sentiments are clear. The poem is a lament for the passing of the province of Britannia, for the fading might and prestige of Rome, for the loss of its power and its wealth. Four centuries after the Western Empire collapsed, the ruins of Roman Britain were still standing, still impressive and clearly to be marvelled at. And they were enormously influential. As Britannia became Britain, the after-glow of romanitas, Roman-ness, helped shape its successor kingdoms, their institutions and their sense of themselves – and our sense of ourselves. In the 5th, 6th and 7th centuries, it was clear that a golden age had passed, but few understood its history or its institutions. [continued on page 5]

# HAPPY 170th BIRTHDAY ST MARY MAG!

People are often surprised to find that Gilsland's Parish Church of St Mary Magdalene is so far from the village. Recently someone asked me if there had once been a mediaeval village surrounding the church, perhaps deserted during the Black Death. The truth is not as dramatic. The church is there because it was built on the land belonging to the man who paid the princely sum of £800 for it to be built - Sir George Mounsey, owner of the Shaws Hotel (better known now as Gilsland Spa Hotel). It was he who founded the church 170 years ago for the people of the village and, of course, his staff and hotel guests.

Until that time the four hamlets that came to form the present village of Gilsland were in the parish of Over Denton and those who wanted to go to church (everyone was expected to) had to walk the mile and a half to the little Saxon church, now closed and hidden away between the river and the railway. Not only did Mounsey arrange and pay for the building of St Mary Magdalene, he also saw to the rebuilding of St Cuthbert, Nether Denton and gave an endowment to pay for the stipend of a vicar to serve both.

St Mary Magdalene was dedicated on 3rd October 1854 and for 170 years has served the community as a place to give thanks, to celebrate happy events, mark the seasons of the year, say goodbye to loved ones and grieve - a place of quiet and tranquillity for residents and visitors alike.

# GILSLAND TO FEATURE IN CELEBRATED HISTORIAN'S NEW BOOK

In the shadow of Hadrian's Wall, the largest Roman monument in the world, this story both begins and ends. Living Among the Ruins will take readers on a journey that reveals how Britannia was one of the foundations of early Britain, that it was not obliterated by centuries of immigration and conquest, or forgotten. Beginning at Jarrow, near the mouth of the River Tyne, at the monastery where Bede, the first scholarly British historian, wrote the magisterial, definitive 'Ecclesiastical History of the English People' in the early 8th century, we travel westwards along the length of the Wall, pausing particularly at Birdoswald, Greenhead and the old Roman city of Carlisle. In the tumbledown forts and towns along the Wall, a new and unexpected story of Rome and Britain will be revealed. And a journey along old roads will reveal old perspectives.

The book should be done by the end of 2025 and published in 2026 if, as my grannie was over-fond of saying, we are all spared.

## THE BORDER REIVERS

The Border Reivers lived on the border in between England and Scotland. They were not very nice to the families who they lived with, apart from some who had family friends. Most of them were farmers and thieves, murderers, kidnappers and blackmailers – basically serious criminals. Punishments were harsh back then: for a petty crime (thieving) they might have lost a few fingers; for spreading lies you could get your tongue cut off; and for murder you would be executed. When Scotland and England fought they would fight too but it got a bit out of hand, they would fight anyone, including the English Reivers fighting the English or the Scottish fighting the Scottish.

There are lots of Reiver names still about today, such as: Armstrong, Nixon, Elliot, Scott, Johnston, Maxwell, Bell, Hall, Charlton, Milburn, Dodd, Robson, Graham, Noble, Irving, Irvine, Routledge, Forster, Rutherford, Croser, Musgrave, Dacre, Carleton, Ridley, Salkeld and many more. If you have one of these surnames you may well have notorious Border Reiver ancestors, I think it is really interesting that there are so many people with these names in the village, just where they would have originated. Kinmont Willie Armstong was probably one of the most famous and notorious Border Reivers. From a very young age he was in the saddle and on raids. He was arrested and locked up in Carlisle Castle on 13th March, 1596, on the day of truce when nobody could be arrested and everybody could meet to discuss deals and treaties. However, he got out with the help of his rescuers on the inside of the castle (which at the time was a prison for cattle thieves). He wasn't locked in a dungeon in chains, he was held in a room in the outer ward so it was easier get him out.

# COLD TO COSY FOR ALL CA8 POSTCODES

The Cold to Cosy Homes Project by Cumbria Action for Sustainability offers free, independent energy saving advice to help you make your home warmer and cheaper to heat. Any house, flat, farms and conversions into homes can qualify.

They are fully funded by the council and do not sell you anything. Once their expert has visited they highlight issues, give advice and can help with some free work and equipment. They will also help you apply for funds if you are eligible for more extensive projects.

Although they serve Cumbria I have asked their Project Officer Maria Appleton and she has advised that anyone in the Gilsland area with a CA8 postcode can apply, even if they are on the Northumberland side of the village.

The criteria to qualify for a free visit is very wide so if you fall into any of these categories give them a call: Anyone in your home over the age of 65, anyone with any health conditions including recently attended hospital after a fall. Mental health, learning and sensory disabilities. Receiving benefits or your gross income is less than £30,000. Just give them a call on 01768 216 500 between 10am and 3pm, Monday – Friday.
