MPs VISIT GILSLAND

On 17th October, councillors from each of the 3 Parish Councils, both the Northumberland and Cumberland County Councillors, both Members of Parliament, and various business and community representatives met to discuss some "hard to sort, long-term" issues.

First up was the dearth of public transport through the village. The Tyne Valley Rail Users Group gave an update on the campaign to re-open Gilsland railway station. One pressing action is to engage with the North East Combined Authority's Local Transport Plan consultation, which is due to open in the new year. Anyone can respond and the more responses the better. All arguments are helpful, from improving residents' transport options, reducing car use, making the village a more desirable place to live and work, stimulating the local economy, to making the rich cultural heritage of the region more accessible.

More positively, Cumberland Council has secured funding to provide a bus service from Carlisle to Gilsland that will connect with the AD122 and run around 3 times a day. It's hoped the service will start by next Spring.

Next up was the lack of a dedicated cycle path between Gilsland and Longbyre, forcing cyclists to share the fast stretch of road with motorists. Parish and County councillors will explore funding and permissions for the route and work with the Walk Wheel Cycle Trust to move this project up their agenda.

Next on our agenda was the poor communications infrastructure. Broadband speeds should soon be faster thanks to Project Gigabit installing fibre optic connections to all households on the Brampton exchange, which also includes the Northumberland side of the village, Longbyre and Greenhead (hence all the new telegraph poles). A representative from Northumberland County Council suggested setting up a local task group to explore with the council and other stakeholders the problematic Digital Voice rollout and poor-to-no mobile phone reception. Next, it was noted that neither the official National Trail footpath that goes behind the school and past Poltross Burn Milecastle nor the diversion through the village are being properly maintained. There are pros and cons to each route but an ideal solution would be to have them both kept

in good condition but with much improved signage, which the parish councils, working with their respective County Officers, will work towards.

Finally, there was an update on Gilsland Spa Hotel, as reported here in September. In summary, the property is currently being renovated with the intention to reopen it as a hotel in due course, which is very welcome news.

FUNGI SEASON IS HERE AT LAST!

Autumn fungi finally emerged a little later than usual this year.

The parts of the fungi that are visible are the fruitbodies whose purpose are to produce and disperse spores. When shed onto suitable soil or dead wood the spores develop into a mass of fibres called a mycelium. This grows larger and produces new fruitbodies the following year. They come in a wide range of shapes, colours, sizes and methods of producing their spores. Spores are produced on gills or pores beneath the cap in toadstools, whereas in others they develop in pits on the hard surface and are forcibly ejected when mature.

Fungi get nutrients in a range of ways: Some are 'rotters', whereby they break down dead wood, leaves, dead creatures, dung, etc and extract useful nutrients, returning many of these to the soil where they are re-used by plants etc. They are a major recycler in the natural ecosystem. Other fungi are 'mycorrhizal', where the fungal mycelia grow in and around the roots of trees and other plants; they make use of some of the nutrients that trees produce by photosynthesis; in return the fungi supply essential nutrients and water to the tree roots. Some fungi feed on living organisms (plants, animals, other fungi) for their nutrients. This is a parasitic relationship which sometimes kills the host, but often they have little ill-effect.

Autumn provides an ideal time to visit woods or grasslands to look at fungi. In grasslands such as churchyards, long-established lawns, meadows etc you might come across waxcap fungi many of which are brightly coloured. In woodlands, take a look at the ground beneath tree canopies where you are likely to come across mycorrhizal fungi such as brittlegills, boletes and milkcaps, some of which are also brightly coloured. Also take a look at fallen branches or dead stumps to search for bracket, resupinate and jelly fungi. Please note that some fungi are extremely poisonous. These toxic fungi can look very similar to others, so do NOT eat or taste any fungi you find and wash hands thoroughly afterwards.

The range of spore colour includes white, pink, yellow, orange, browns, purple and black. To see this, cut the stalk just below the cap of a toadstool and lay the cap (gill side down) on the overlap of a piece of white and black paper (to allow both dark or light colours to be seen). Cover over with a bowl or tub and leave overnight. In the morning you should have a spore print when you carefully lift the cap. This will show the positions of the gills or pores, as well as the colour of the spores. Have fun!
